Aboriginal Health Practitioners (AHP) and AHP Trainees help contribute to the patient journey by:

- Utilising a cultural and clinical skill set
- Connecting with patients who are far from home
- Helping the patient connect with family and community
- Understanding the cultural, environmental, and social determinants of health
- Advocating for the patients to ensure their voice is heard

Clinical Services:

Throughout the patient's journey through the health system, we are here to help them.

Some services we can provide:

- Social, Emotional, Physical, Spiritual and Mental wellbeing support including social and cultural visits with patients
- Cultural Care Planning including working within the multidisciplinary team
- Supporting health and understanding by utilising culturally appropriate resources for inpatient education
- Support informed consent with use of interpreting services
- Linking with outside services: CTG, Sonder, NDIS and InCOMPro

Discharge Planning

To ensure safe discharge home we can help:

- Reconnect patients to their local health clinic, including referral to new services
- Assist with forward planning for ongoing access to medication, appointments
- Completion of Patient Assisted Travel Scheme (PATS) paperwork
- Navigation of local health networks and communities, including accessing funding for discharge
- Utilisation of local and community knowledge to safely plan travel home


CALHN's Aboriginal Identity Artwork WARDLI PURRUTINTHI 'Place to live or to be alive' Designed by accomplished Aboriginal South Australian artist Allan Sumner, a descendant of the Ngarrindjeri, Kaurna and Yankunytjatjara people.

The circle in the middle of the artwork represents the 'Wardli Purrutinthi' or Central Adelaide Local Health Network. CALHN is positioned centrally, and connects our hospitals, community health services and clinical services together.
